Reasons to aspire to study at University

- Students with high aspirations and expectations achieve, on average, 2 more GCSEs graded 9-4 than students with low aspirations and expectations. Khattab 2015.
- Graduates can command a higher salary in comparison with school and college leavers. According to 2016 research from the Institute for Fiscal Studies, graduates in their late thirties earn about 1.6 times as much per hour as those who left school at 16. A report by the job website, Adzuna, found that jobseekers without a degree could earn up to £12,000 a year less than their graduate peers entering the job market – the equivalent of more than £500,000 over an average working life.
- Not all school-leavers are certain about their goals in life. At university you're able to explore a range of possibilities within your subject area and discover the potential career options available jobs you might not have considered or were even aware of.
- Besides the knowledge associated with the degree studied, university graduates also pick up useful transferable skills that employers are looking for such as time management and organisational skills.
- Last on the list, but probably most important, is how the university experience will shape you into who you will become and leads you to realising your ambitions. The experience at university is truly a unique one.

Strategic Objectives (INTENT)

The Ambition Strategy seeks to provide a pathway throughout Key Stages 3, 4 & 5 for every student to achieve their highest academic ambitions. Every student at St Bede's Catholic School and Byron Sixth Form shall benefit from the Ambition Strategy, with Key Stage 3 gaining increased exposure to and engagement with careers provision and higher education.

The Ambition Scholars Programme seeks to focus assets and resources on students aiming to gain entry to the UK's most prestigious institutions. Participants on the programme from Year 10 to Year 13 shall partake in additional seminars and opportunities aiming to develop

their academic rigour and cultural capital reserves, often partaking across year groups in prospective fields.

- Key Stage 3: To provide students with experiences, opportunities and insight involving higher education and a wide range of high quality career prospects
- Key Stage 4: To increase the proportion of (high attaining) students transitioning from St Bede's to Byron
- Key Stage 5: To increase the number of Byron students applying to the country's most prestigious, academically renowned institutions
