
Talk, don't just monitor

- Have regular conversations about apps, games & online friends
- Set clear rules about screen time & online behaviour



- Set up devices in your name as parent/carer
- Review privacy settings on social media & gaming apps
- Remind your child never to share personal details or locations publicly

Practical tips


- Keep devices in shared spaces, especially at night

- New homework policy for 2025-26
- Pupils are currently practising this policy in school for three weeks to ensure all pupils understand the expectations, and pupils who may need additional support can be identified.
- Retrieval homework set each night from Monday-Friday (approx. 30 minutes)
- Homework for years 7-9 will consist of the retrieval homework set from knowledge organisers.
- Homework for years 10 and 11 will consist of retrieval homework set from knowledge organisers and any additional homework subject teachers

- Each night homework for years 7-11 will consist of Look, Cover, Write, Check, Respond and 5 questions from the knowledge organiser booklet.
- Look, Cover, Write, Check, Respond is a retrieval/revision method with the aim of moving information into the long-term memory.
- Knowledge Organiser booklets contain the key knowledge pupils need to succeed in each subject.
- All pupils need to do is memorise the information in the knowledge of the organiser booklets, parents don't need any additional knowledge to Bishop Clatholic Education Support pupils with homework.



The Look, Cover, Write, Check, Respond process:

- Look: Focus on a small chunk of information (e.g, sentence or bullet point from knowledge organiser booklet)
- Cover: Place something over the information to hide it (planner, paper etc)
- <u>Write</u>: Write the information down from memory in the homework book.
- Check: Reveal the original text and compare it to what you've written.
- Respond: In green pen, make any necessary corrections or fill in any

gaps so the text you have written matches the original in the Bishop Chadwick



Knowledge Organiser: (RE - Year 8: Cycle 1)

Key Knowledge:

What is baptism and who is it for?

Some people are baptised as babies because this gets rid of their original sin as early as possible. Some people have believer's baptism as an adult because they can understand the promises they are making

What does love of neighbour mean today?

Jesus taught that one of the greatest commandments was to love our neighbour. A neighbour is anyone- it doesn't matter if we know or like them- we should love them.

The story of the Good Samaritan teaches us to look after people even if they from a different community. In the letter Fratelli Tutti (All Brothers and Sisters) Pope Francis reminds us that we are all connected to each other just like family and therefore should care for everyone.

What is a prophetic text?

Prophets share God's messages. They make prophecies which can be warnings, encouragement or predictions.

Prophetic texts follow a pattern of being called by God, having a message to deliver and fulfilment of the message.

Sometimes prophecies suggested terrible events would occur unless people returned to following God's laws. Amos talked about our need to repent (be sorry for what we have done).

Behaviour Update 2025-2026

Your behaviour is not in line with the core values of the school – a warning is issued to change your behaviour.



You continue to display behaviour not in line with the schools core values – you are issued with 1 Behaviour Point (1BP).

- · This is logged on Abor and parents / carers notified.
- . You write 1BP in your planner and it is signed by the teacher.



Even after a BP issued, you continue to display behaviour not in line with the schools core values. You are then issued with another BP and removed from the classroom.

- · This is logged on Abor and parents / carers notified.
- . You write 1BP in your planner and it is signed by the teacher.
- You wait for Tour to collect you or walk to the classroom indicated by your teacher.



If you get removed from your room removal room you are then issued with another BP, removed from the classroom and taken to Base.

- This is logged on Abor and parents / carers notified.
- . You write 18P in your planner and it is signed by the teacher.
- . You wait for Tour to collect you.

2BP = Truancy and Absconding

Behaviour Update 2025-2026 Debits

All detentions will take place the following day, so that:

- Students can have a fresh start the following day.
- Students can reflect on their previous day and be the best version of themselves.
- All behaviours can be monitored on a lesson-by-lesson basis with a serious incidents being picked up straight away.
- Any errors can be picked up quickly

Most incidents are indicated as 1 Behaviour Point.

However, 2 Behaviour Points are issued for the following;

- Truancy
- Absconding







Importance of regular Attendance Legal requirement to attend school

- •It is illegal to not attend school regularly without good reason (The Education Act 1996).
- •This means it is a criminal offence if parents/carers do not ensure their child attends school regularly and on time.
- •The Government have declared tackling poor attendance as a national priority.
- •If your child is unable to attend school, please contact the main office as soon as possible.
- •If your child is absent, they must get caught up on work missed and compete the work in their knowledge organiser.
- Attendance above 97% is coded 'GREEN' (Safety Zone)
- Attendance between 92% and 96.99% is coded 'AMBER' (At Risk Zone)
- Attendance below 92% is coded 'RED' (Danger zone)







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Facts and Figures

- •St Bede's whole school attendance last academic year was **90.5**%
- With 16,000 days of lost learning and 80,000 lessons being missed.
- •On average, each pupil lost **18 days** of school (almost 4 full weeks), which is **90 lessons** of lost learning.
- At the end of the year almost 1 in 3 pupils had an attendance below 90%.
- •These pupils are now deemed as being 'persistently absent' from school; pupils within this group are twice as likely to **not achieve their academic potential.**
- •These pupils will statistically **drop at least 1 GCSE grade per subject** if attendance continues to be below the minimum expected standard.

If a pupil has an attendance of 90% or below in each year of their time in school, they will miss over **500** lessons.

Equates to 2 days off school each year	99%	Excellent
Equates to 5 days off school each year	97%	Good
Equates to 10 days off school each year	95%	Slight Concern
Equates to 20 days off school each year	90%	Concerned
Equates to 30 days off school each year	85%	Very Concerned
